Give a detailed explanation, using a variety of Bible quotes/teachings and key terminology, of different Christian views on sexual relationships.</p> <p>Express a clear knowledge and understanding of the views that different Christians take towards homosexuality.</p> <p>Compare Christian views on sexual relationships with non-religious attitudes</p> <p>Give a detailed account of Christian teachings on the purpose and importance of family, making explicit reference to Ephesians 6:1-14.</p> <p>Compare and contrast Christian and non-religious responses to the family.</p> <p>Explain the different types of family giving advantages and disadvantages of each type.</p> <p>Explain non-religious attitudes to families.</p> <p>Explain and evaluate Christian support for the family in the local parish.</p> <p>Explain in depth, using Bible quotes and reference to Humanae Vitae, the views that different Christian denominations would take towards natural and artificial contraception. Analyse humanist and atheist approaches to family planning.</p> <p>Consider the application of situation ethics.</p> <p>Explain in detail, the views of different denominations towards divorce and remarriage. Support your explanation with specific reference to Bible teachings.</p> <p>Compare and contrast Christian and non-religious views on this topic.</p> <p>Give a detailed explanation (including Genesis 1-3 and Ephesians 5:21-30) of different Christian teachings and attitudes to the role of men/women in the family. Compare with humanist/atheist views and give responses. Evaluate Christian teachings about gender prejudice and discrimination (including Galatians 3:23-29). Compare this with humanist/atheist views.</p>	<p>You are able to:</p> <p>Use key terminology such as: reverence, clergy, vestments etc. to discuss the different types of liturgical/non-liturgical worship.</p> <p>Explain the importance of having different types of worship and explain how the faith of a believer can be strengthened by each one.</p> <p>Explain in detail, using key terminology and Bible teachings, the sacraments of Baptism and the Eucharist, analyse their importance in two denominations.</p> <p>Make a detailed comparison of the different importance of sacraments in Roman Catholic and Methodist/Baptist churches.</p> <p>Evaluate the importance of prayer for Christians.</p> <p>Explain the importance of pilgrimage to Christians, giving a detailed account of at least three places of pilgrimage. State why the place is important and what happens there.</p> <p>Explain the difference in Catholic/Protestant beliefs about pilgrimage.</p> <p>Evaluate the importance of pilgrimage for modern Christians.</p> <p>Make extensive reference to the Bible (including 1 Corinthians 15:12-34), give a detailed explanation of Christmas and Easter, evaluating the importance of these celebrations for Christians today.</p> <p>Give detailed explanation, referencing Mark 16:9-20 and John 21:21-22, of the history and purpose of missionary and evangelical work.</p> <p>Evaluate the importance of missionary and evangelical work.</p> <p>Give a detailed explanation and evaluation of the work undertaken by the church to support the local community.</p> <p>Give specific reference to projects/organisations.</p> <p>Explain and evaluate the role of the church globally.</p> <p>Explain the work of more than one Christian charity, demonstrating how its work supports Christian teaching on charity.</p>	<p>You are able to:</p> <p>Explain in depth, using key terminology with confidence, the views held by scientists about the creation of the universe and humanity.</p> <p>Counter scientific arguments with Christian viewpoints (supported by Bible teaching), including the work of Georges Lemaitre.</p> <p>Evaluate Christian and non-religious attitudes to the origins and value of the universe.</p> <p>Explain in considerable depth, why Christians believe that life is special and the importance of sanctity of life for modern Christians.</p> <p>Evaluate Christian and non-religious attitudes to sanctity of life.</p> <p>Explain in depth and evaluate, using key arguments, Christian responses to non-religious arguments about the origins and value of human life</p> <p>Give a detailed explanation, using Bible teaching, of abortion.</p> <p>Evaluate different Christian and non-religious attitudes to abortion.</p> <p>Demonstrate a comprehensive knowledge of Christian and non-religious arguments for life after death and explain with clarity why people have these beliefs. Compare these views with arguments against life after death.</p> <p>Give a detailed and well-rounded account of the views that different Christians have of different types of euthanasia, using Bible teachings to support.</p> <p>Show detailed consideration for the kind of concerns that Christians may have for the world, linking to beliefs and teaching about stewardship.</p> <p>Demonstrate clear understanding of Christian views relating to the different uses of animals.</p> <p>Evaluate different Christian attitudes to the natural world.</p>

You are able to:

Explain the importance and purpose of marriage, using specific Bible quotes and teachings.

Clearly explain the different views on divorce and remarriage, making clear reference to Bible teachings.

Make a comparison between Christian and non-religious views on the issues of divorce and remarriage.

Discuss in detail, the different views that Christians have on the roles of men and women in the family. Compare this to non-religious views.

Explain the views taken by Christians on the issue of gender discrimination. Attempt to use bible teachings to support.

Living the Christian Life

You are able to:

Confidently discuss the different types of liturgical/ non-liturgical worship, making links to different denominations.

Explain why different types of worship are so important to Christians.

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Explain, in some detail, the sacraments of Baptism and the Eucharist. Give reasons for their importance in two denominations.

Make a detailed comparison of sacraments and their importance in Roman Catholic and Methodist/Baptist churches.

Describe the importance of at least three places of Christian pilgrimage.

Using teachings from the Bible to support, give a detailed explanation of Christmas and Easter and explain why these festivals are so crucial to life as a Christian.

Highlight the different types of prayer used by Christians and speculate on the reasons for each different type being important.

Discuss with confidence, specific examples of missionary/ evangelical work with Christianity (focusing on national and global level).

Clearly explain the different Christian views on the importance of evangelical work.

Give a detailed explanation of the work undertaken by the church to support the local community. Include specific examples of projects/organisations.

Discuss with confidence, the role of the church globally, making specific reference to reconciliation.

Research the work of different Christian charities, explaining how their work supports Christian teachings.

Matters of Life and Death

You are able to:

Explain, using the correct terminology, the views held by scientists about the creation of the universe and humanity.

Confidently discuss the idea that the universe is a commodity.

Explain, in some depth, Christian counter arguments to non-religious arguments about creation, making explicit reference to Genesis.

Demonstrate understanding of how life is shown as special, using the Bible to support.

Explain different Christian and non-religious attitudes to the sanctity of life.

Discuss, with some confidence, Christian responses to non-religious arguments about the origins and value of human life (including survival of the fittest)

Explain clearly, the different Christian views on abortion, showing an understanding of the terms pro-choice and pro-life.

Show an awareness of different Christian attitudes to life after death, including terms such as purgatory.

Compare Christian arguments on life after death to non-religious arguments. Use Bible teachings to add strength to your answer.

Confidently explain the views held by Christians on euthanasia (in all its forms). Support this with Bible teaching.

Explain the views that Christians have on stewardship and the role of animals in the world/ animal rights. Use bible references to support.

Give some examples of types of worship.

Talk about why worship is important to Christians.

Say what the word sacrament means.

Talk about the role of sacraments in two different denominations.

Perform a simple comparison of the sacraments in the Roman Catholic church and Methodist/Baptist churches.

Discuss what pilgrimage is and at least one place Christians may go on pilgrimage.

State what happens at Christmas and Easter, how these events are celebrated and why they're important.

Say what prayer is.

State what missionary and evangelical work is.

Outline the role of the church in the local community and how it helps the individual.

State how the church helps people globally, giving an example.

Discuss Jesus' teaching on charity.

Talk about the work carried out by Christian Aid.

Matters of Life and Death**You are able to:**

Talk in simple terms about how scientists believe the universe and humanity were created.

Give simple responses to scientific views of creation, from a Christian view.

Using a Bible quote, say why Christians think human life is holy.

State simply, why life is so valuable to Christians.

State what an abortion is and show awareness of Christian views on the issue.

State the reason why Christians believe in life after death.

State the views that other people (such as those who are not religious) might have about life after death.

Give two arguments against life after death and consider how a Christian might respond to them.

State what euthanasia is and demonstrate an awareness of Christian views on the issue.

State what stewardship is and what Christians might say about animal rights.
